THE GREAT AMERICAN SOLAR ECLIPSE

The Great American Solar Eclipse that visited North America on Monday April 8th was exceptional. The duration of totality for some was up to 4 minutes and 27 seconds. For many it was not their first time viewing a total eclipse but for others it was. The April 8, 2024, total eclipse was witnessed by millions of people. The exquisite beauty of the Sun's corona hanging in the suddenly darkened sky was truly worth seeing. And to not miss a chance on a learning experience of this once in lifetime spectacular astronomical event, Mrs. Marsha Groll's Middle School science class participated in a solar eclipse model contest. Models were judged on creativity, moving parts, and written descriptions. Seventh graders learned about solar eclipse safety and made pinhole viewers. Superintendent's Message

Hello, Bobcat Families,

At the May 13 Board of Education Meeting, the Trustees approved a resolution to call a vote on August 6, 2024 for a bond project. We have an opportunity to generate \$10 million with a Zero Mill increase from the current bond levy. As part of the Strategic Plan 2022-2027, Whiteford Schools wants to remain a small district that meets the individual needs of the students and families it serves. The bond project would improve the elementary building and outside athletic fields. For the elementary building, this bond project would add four (4) classrooms that would allow us to lower class sizes, keep fifth graders at the elementary, and control our enrollment as part of the 66/70 plan outlined in our Strategic Plan. Additionally, the elementary would add a flex space addition where we could utilize it as a creative space for Physical Education (PE/Gym) classes, indoor recess, building-wide assemblies, Whiteford Rec league basketball practices and games, and Whiteford Parent Association (WPA) events. We would also add two single stall bathrooms, replace the roof, and upgrade the boiler. The athletic improvements are also addressed in our current Strategic Plan as we improve and maintain the physical assets of the district. We have aging structures, poor playing surfaces, and drainage issues that are limiting our playability during the wet fall or spring sports seasons. We would relocate the baseball and softball fields and replace all sports fields drainage tiles, irrigation, and playing surfaces. We would see new dugouts, press boxes, fencing, backstops, bleachers, and a new track storage building with additional bathrooms and concession stands. The community will have the opportunity to attend in-person bond meetings this spring/summer to learn more about the scope and costs of the project. If approved by voters, we will be in a great position heading into the future and remain as one of the best kept secrets in southern Michigan! We are better together - We are Whiteford!

Transitional Kindergarten Program

Based upon survey data collected from families in December/January and other considerations, we are moving forward with a Transitional Kindergarten (TK) classroom for the 2024-2025 school year. The program is designed for students who will turn 5 between May 1, 2024-December 1, 2024. Students who turn 5 before May 1, 2024, will also be considered based on screening results. We will begin contacting parents of students who meet the criteria for Transitional Kindergarten after May 1 to seek interest in enrolling in the Transitional Kindergarten program.


Transportation Request Forms



DISTRICT IMPROVEMENTS

Proposal 1 - If passed would generate \$9.6 million for the following improvements:

Elementary School

- · Add Four Classrooms
- Add Flex Space/Bathroom/Storage
- Add Two Single Stall Bathrooms
- Replace Roof
 Upgrade Boiler/Pump

- Replace all Sports Field Drainage Tiles, Irrigation, and Playing Surfaces
- · Relocate Baseball and Softball Fields
- · Replace Dugouts, Press Boxes, Fencing, Backstops, and Bleachers

Proposal 2 - If passed would generate \$400,000 for adding synthetic field turf for softball field and baseball infield instead of just natural grass outlined in Proposal 1. Essentially, the passing of this proposal would add turf if Proposal 1 passes. If it fails, the fields would remain natural grass.

What does it cost me?

Since these bond proposals, if passed, are expected to keep the tax rate the same as the current levy, this is expected to be a "ZERO MILL" net increase from the current levy. If both proposals pass, the tax rate is estimated to remain the same at 4.93 mills after the bonds are issued.

Why is the district proposing an Estimated Zero Mill net increase bond proposal now?

We have an opportunity to generate new funds for capital improvements with an estimated Zero Mill Net increase from the current bond levy. As part of the Strategic Plan 2022-2027, Whiteford Schools wants to remain a small district that meets the individual needs of the students and families it serves. It is our goal to keep KG-5th grade classes at twenty-two (22) students per classroom, which allows for a bit of growth with new students moving into the district. We project that the district would need to offer three sections of each grade level at the elementary to accomplish this ratio.

In order to successfully carry out this plan, we need four (4) additional classrooms at the elementary. The elementary flex addition would be utilized as a creative space for Physical Education (PE/Gym), indoor recess, building-wide assemblies, and other events. The athletic improvements are also addressed in our current Strategic Plan to improve and maintain the physical assets of the district. We have aging softball and baseball dugouts and press boxes. The playing surfaces do not drain well during the fall and spring sports' seasons for the football, softball, and baseball fields.

Robotics.....goes to STATES!



With thousands of teams competing worldwide in FIRST Robotics, this is a league like no other. Michigan alone has over 600 teams and the Whiteford Bobcats finished the season in the top 20%!

For the first time ever, the Whiteford Robotics team competed at a State Tournament! The team made this achievement by earning qualification points at two district tournaments including 40 teams, both of which the Bobcats placed third.

A robotics team is much more than meets the eye!

The **Build and Programming Team** diligently prepared the bot for each competition and in between matches. During the initial building phase, the build team spends practices working on different parts of the robot. We split up into groups and some work on the climber, some on the arm, and some on the shooter. The **Programming Team** uses Java programming to bring the hardware the **Build Team** creates to life! Together the robot will drive itself using cameras and sensors.

The Communications Team are the designers of the team swag and pit. We also help with sponsor communications, social media, and provide support during matches. We cheer for our team, scout other teams, learning strengths and weaknesses for our lead strategist to use.

And finally, the <u>Drive Team</u> executes! This season we had a driver, a shooter, a technician, and even a human player. The human player this season could give the robot game pieces and help score extra points.

Together, the team reached their goal of competing in the Michigan State Championship.

School Bond Proposal Language Summary

I. - Shall Whiteford Agricultural School District of the Counties of Monroe and Lenawee, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Nine Million Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$9,600,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefor, in one or more series, for the purpose of:






State FFA Convention Results

The Whiteford FFA Chapter traveled to East Lansing, Michigan for the 96th State FFA Convention on Wednesday February 28th through Friday March 1st. Members that advanced past regionals were able to compete in State level Leadership contests. Members attending the state convention also watched FFA convention sessions, watched other FFA member's speeches and presentations, and received their own awards, including the FFA State Degree, FFA Outstanding Junior Degree, and Academic Excellence Awards.

To earn their State FFA Degree, FFA members must earn over \$3000 on their Ag/Natural Resources related job, participate in 5 FFA events above the chapter level, and perform at least 25 hours of community service. State Degree recipients are also eligible for 6 free general credits to attend MSU. The following members earned their State FFA Degrees: Kenzie Gray, Jack Iott, Jake Iott, Abby Johnson, Zach Kahn, Trent Olrich, Anna Schober, Aubrie Simmons, Margo Thomas, and Reagan Wing.

Some of our members earned their Outstanding Junior FFA Degree (for juniors). From the classroom...

Middle School

Students in 7th grade life science stomata lab finished up a unit on photosynthesis. In this lab students created impressions of plant leaves using nail polish, tape, and microscope slides. Once the impressions were lifted off the leaves, students were able to further investigate and count the stomata on the surface of the leaves. Stomata are responsible for the gas exchange of carbon dioxide and oxygen which are reactants and products of the photosynthetic chemical reaction that occurs in plants.





The 8th grade science classes had a ball learning about Newton's 2nd Law of Motion. Students launched various balls to investigate the effects of friction and mass on acceleration.









Why did the Bobcats go into the woods? To make maple syrup of course! This year, Mrs. Vittore's 8th grade Ag Explore classes took on the task of making their own maple syrup using tree sap from our very own woods. The project started this last fall with students learning how to identify trees. Students then spent much of the month of February learning how to tap the maple trees and collecting sap. Once enough sap was collected (about 35 gallons), students learned about food safety and food processing so they could cook the raw tree sap down into syrup. With 5 pints of pure *Whiteford* maple syrup, the class celebrated with a pancake breakfast before heading off on spring break.
